VIEWPOINT

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

The fact that the A21 by-pass and the controversial link road joining the two portions of Beagles Wood Road were on the agenda no doubt caused the Annual Parish Meeting on March 14th to be one of the best attended for several years.

About 100 parishioners attended the meeting in the Village Hall and heard Mr. John Bergg, assistant county surveyor and Mr. Arthur Hill of the county's Highways Department speak about plans for the A21 by-pass and the likely programme for carrying out the work.

Parish Council chairman, Mrs. Sarah Clarke warned that once the by-pass line was approved there would inevitably be pressure to develop spare pieces of land between the by-pass and the existing A21 and the Parish Council would have to be vigilant in protecting the village from undesirable building operations. She emphasised that unrestricted building on such land could radically alter Pembury's character and would have to be carefully watched.

Many members of the audience came from Beagles Wood Road and adjoining roads, and several of them voiced their views for and against having the two lengths of Beagles Wood Road joined together.

Some stressed the need for the link road on the grounds that a through road would take traffic pressure off the present unsatisfactory junctions of Romford Road and Henwood Green Road and Romford Road and Lower Green Road. One view in favour of the link stressed that emergency services summoned to Beagles Wood Road might find themselves entering the wrong section of road – a matter of grave importance in a crisis.

On the other hand, several speakers urged that the link road should not be built because it would have the effect of turning Beagles Wood Road into a race track with vehicles taking a short cut from Romford into Maidstone Road.

At the end of the meeting residents in Beagles Wood and adjoining roads were asked to vote on the matter. The result was 18 in favour of a link road and 11 in favour of a linking footpath only. Nevertheless at its meeting on April 10th the Parish Council voted to recommend that the link road should not be built.

YOUR CLERK REPORTS

Pembury has strong sporting links through its many sports clubs, such as bowls, badminton, cricket, football, hockey, lawn tennis and table tennis. It has always been Parish Council policy to try to help the clubs. At present my members are talking to Pembury's football clubs, the bowls club and the hockey club about improvements to their facilities generated by the clubs themselves.

The Parish Council is also looking into the possible community use of further accommodation that could, perhaps, be used for badminton, five-a-side football, indoor bowls etc. If these inquiries bear fruit it will be contacting the clubs with further details.

The Parish Council has provided a hard tennis court for use by parishioners the whole year round. A season ticket costing £10 for the yearly use of this hard court is excellent value. In addition, annual ticket holders for the hard court can, for an extra £5 a year, play on the grass courts used by Pembury Lawn Tennis Club during the summer. Or if you enjoy an occasional game on the grass courts during the summer only, a period season ticket costs you only £10. Although this use is on a restricted basis, the Lawn Tennis Club is to be applauded in agreeing to the additional use by members of the public. It is hoped that this might be one way of attracting new members to the club.

Times from May 19th to September 9th on which the public can use the grass courts are:—

Monday 2 p.m. to 9 p.m. or dusk if earlier
Tuesday 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. *
Thursday 2 p.m. to 5 p.m., 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. or dusk if earlier
Friday 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.
Saturday 2 p.m. to 9 p.m. or dusk if earlier *

*These periods of play are to be shared between members of the public and members of Pembury Lawn Tennis Club.

Obviously the numbers using this grass court facility must of necessity be limited. If you are interested please contact me as soon as possible as the tickets will be sold on a first come first served basis.

After many months of construction work and a set-back caused by winter gales which ripped off part of the roof cladding, the Pembury Woodside Youth Club building has opened its doors, although some minor interior decoration has still to be done.

The club is divided into seniors, aged 13 to 21 and juniors aged 8 to 13. These age limits will be strictly adhered to. The annual subscription for seniors is £1. Weekly subscriptions are 20p for members and 35p for non-members. Meeting nights are Mondays and Wednesdays from 7 to 9.30 p.m. and other nights as required. The junior club will open on Fridays from 7 to 8.30 p.m. The annual membership fee is 50p with a weekly subscription of 25p or 35p for non-members. At the age of 13 a member may transfer to the senior club if he or she wishes, or stay with the junior club for a further year or so.

A varied programme has been planned which includes swimming trips to Larkfield, a visit to Margate on June 23rd, visits to other clubs for team challenges, and discos. The Leader in charge, Mr. Malcolm Brown, telephone Paddock Wood 4697, is the person to apply to for membership, which may be done at the club on meeting nights. Mr. Brown hopes to start the Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme later in the year. Many jobs need to be done during a youth club evening and volunteers are invited to contact Malcolm or just come along and have a cup of coffee and a chat. A volunteer is particularly required to run the coffee bar, but help in any way will be welcome.

IN BRIEF



Tunbridge Wells Borough Council is responsible, under the county council, for Civil Defence planning. Plans drawn up envisage the division of the borough into areas and, under them communities, such as Pembury, each responsible for their own planning subject to overall control from the areas, staffed by local government officers. The Parish Council has been asked to submit names for a community advisor – in effect the leader of a team of Civil Defence volunteers. The advisor's functions would include assembling a team of volunteers and drawing up plans for the village. Anyone wishing to be considered for this post should submit his or her name to Parish Council Clerk, Mr. Henry Plant.

Pembury Ladies Social Group has completed a successful first year of existence and closes its current programme on June 19th. The Group will shortly hold its annual meeting and draw up its new programme, starting in September.

A petition signed by a number of residents in Lower Green Road, asking for a pavement on the east side of the road from Amberleaze Drive to the Free Church, has been passed to Kent County Council. The K.C.C.'s response is that constructing the pavement would cause severe traffic hold-ups and the matter has been shelved until after the construction of the B2015 by-pass which, it is hoped, will remove much of the traffic from the road. However, the county has said it will take steps to improve the drainage along that side of the road.

Tunbridge Wells Borough Council has a new vehicle capable of emptying rubbish skips on the spot instead of carting them away. It is hoped this will eliminate the problem of overflowing skips suffered by residents in Elmhurst Avenue and Bulls Place. It is planned to empty these skips daily in future. The Borough has asked the Parish Council to name an extra five or six sites where skips can be sited so that no skip need remain on one site more than five days in a month.

The Mums and Tiny Tots Club will remain open during the school summer holidays. The Club will continue its regular Tuesday meetings – at 1.45pm in the Free Church Hall – throughout the holiday period. All mums – and dads – and under-fives are welcome to come along to share the toys, creative corners and a social afternoon with refreshments at a fee of 50p a session.

our by-pass campaign

If all goes according to plan, work should start on the A21 Pembury by-pass in November next year and the road should be completed late in 1987.

This hopeful statement was made by assistant county surveyor Mr. John Bergg at the annual Parish Meeting on March 14th. Mr. Bergg made his statement in the light of the report of the Inspector who conducted the by-pass inquiry in November 1982. The report was issued in February and, with one major and a few minor alterations, endorsed the route proposed by the Department of Transport at the inquiry.

Because of these alterations, objectors had until April 6th to object. As no representations have been made it is expected the Department will confirm the route in May.

Working on this assumption Mr. Bergg said the County Council, as the Department's agent, would take about a year to produce detailed plans and a further six months to engage contractors. On that timetable it was hoped to be on site by November 1985 and to complete the work in two years.

The by-pass will be 2.85 miles long with 24-foot wide dual carriageways, a central reservation and grass verges. Much of it will run in a cutting. Cornford Lane and Chalket Lane will each have bridges across it, but the Northern end of Blackhurst Lane will be stopped up. There will also be a cattle underpass at Kippings Cross Farm.

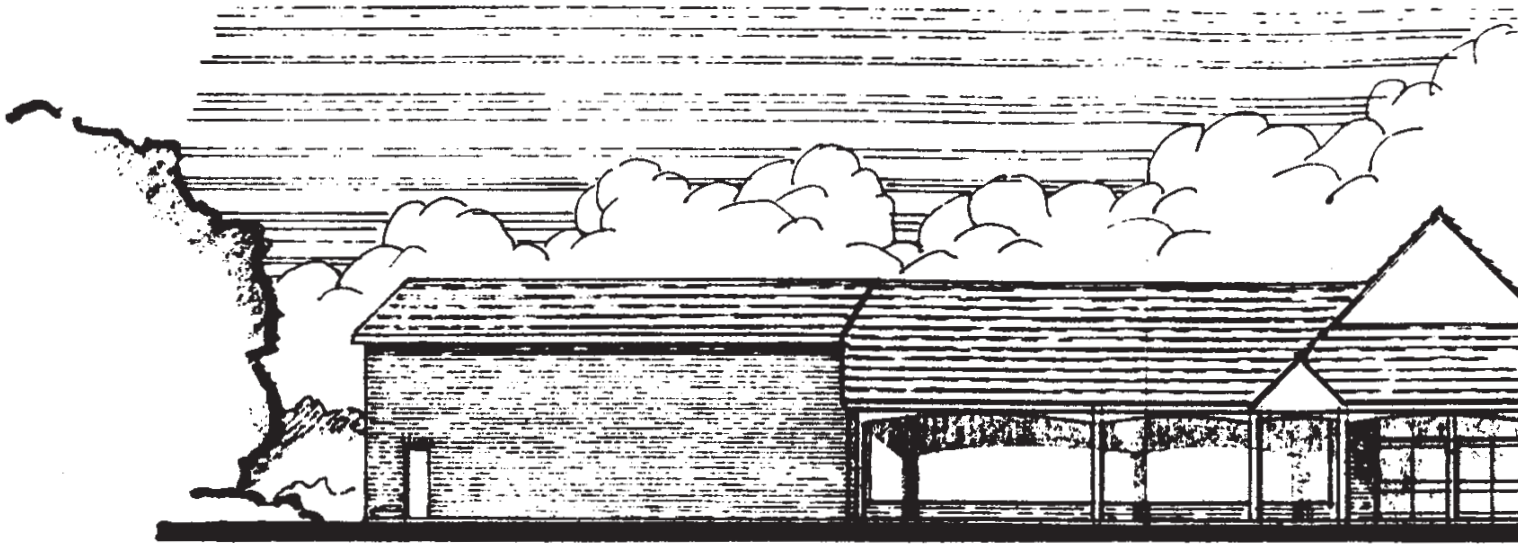
Constructing the by-pass – costing £11 million at 1982 prices – will involve no demolition of property although some houses will need noise insulation. Altogether about 86 acres of land will be needed for the road.

The main change from the Department's route will push the by-pass about 80 yards further south behind the eastern end of the village. This will involve the destruction of part of Roughlands Shaw. The amended route will be in a cutting instead of on an embankment, so enabling a footbridge to be built carrying Footpath 237 – from Canterbury Road to the Old Coach Road – across the by-pass. The original scheme envisaged taking the footpath across the road on the level, which the inspector considered too hazardous.

How traffic is ruining the centre of Pembury was made clear at the inquiry, where it was stated that a daily average of 25,000 vehicles passed through the High Street, at least 2,000 of them very large goods vehicles. Without a by-pass this flow was expected to rise to 34,000 daily by the year 2000. The recommended daily flow for such a road is 17,000 vehicles.

The by-pass will run from the existing roundabout on the A21 at the junction with the North Farm link road, to Kippings Cross where there will be another roundabout.

FRONT ELEVATION TO BEAGLES WOOD ROAD

A plan to build a shopping complex on the 'Royal Oak' site, consisting of a supermarket and four smaller shops has been recommended for approval by Pembury Parish Council and will shortly be considered by the Borough Council's planning committee.

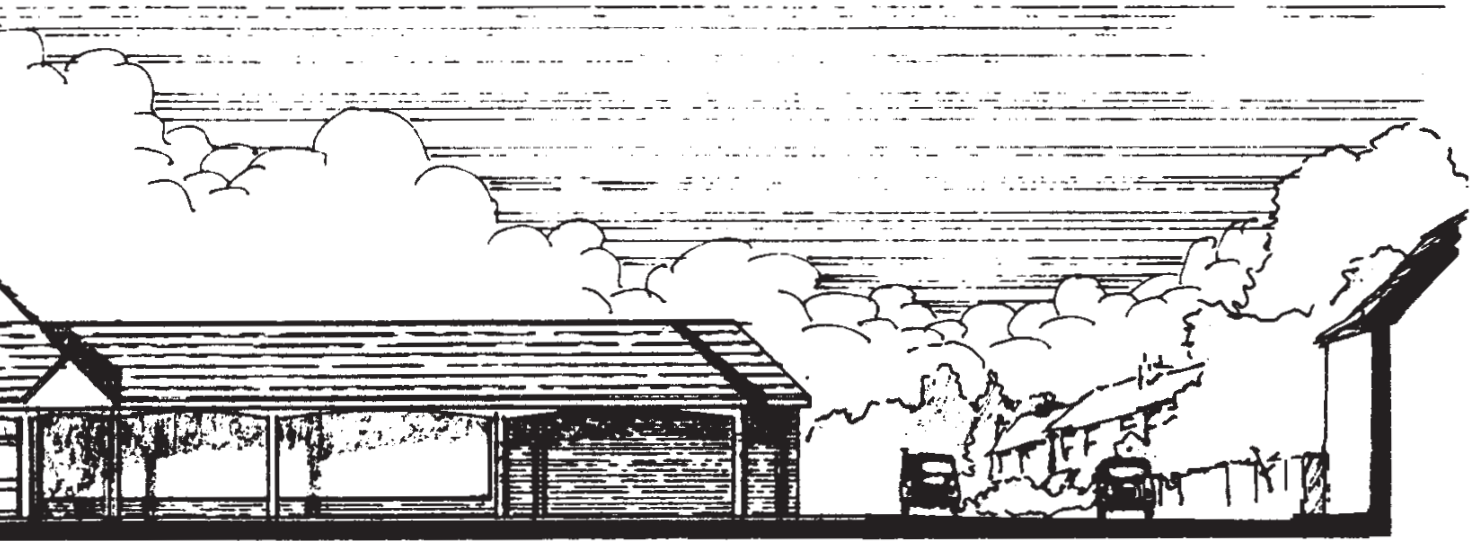
The owners of the 1½-acre site, Wards Construction (Medway) Ltd., had earlier submitted plans for one large supermarket building, with parking space for 122 cars. The Parish Council criticised the plan on several counts when submitting its views to Tunbridge Wells Borough Council and the plan was ultimately withdrawn.

Following discussions with the Borough and Parish Council, Wards submitted their latest plan in March. This plan shows a marked difference from previous plans for developing the site.

The proposed supermarket building covers little more than half the planned shopping area, the remainder being taken up by four smaller shop units of different sizes.

The supermarket and the four shops are planned to face one another across a covered concourse, one entrance to which faces Beagles Wood Road and the other directly on to the car park.

In their application Wards say they wish to provide 94 car parking spaces. Four of these are sited on what is at present the garden plot alongside the Royal Oak and the Parish Council has suggested that these spaces should be eliminated and the garden left as it is. The Council has also suggested that the site should be surrounded by a close-boarded fence instead of the chain-link fencing proposed by the developers.

In a covering letter to the Borough Council, Wards say they have agreed terms with the Budgen supermarket chain, based in Uxbridge. And they urge a speedy decision on their application as they hope to begin work on the site in June or July this year.

One of the terms of the previously-granted planning permission was that Wards should build a small meeting room for parish use. As this would have to be built on part of the site owned by the Borough Council, the developers say they are willing to discuss this matter later on. Another condition of the permission was that Wards should build the link road joining the two sections of Beagles Wood Road, but in view of the Parish Council's decision to recommend against the link it seems unlikely this condition will be enforced.



AGE CONCERN

Plans to build a day care centre for the elderly in Pembury by extending the Upper Church are not yet finalised. A scheme to build a dual-purpose day care centre and parish room on to the north side of the church, received planning permission from Tunbridge Wells Borough Council and the blessing of the Fine Arts Committee.

However, the county council's Social Services Department which, with Age Concern and the church, is involved in the scheme, now plans to look into the matter further and assess whether the existing plan will meet the requirements of a centre capable of dealing with a proportion of seriously disabled elderly people.

In the meantime Age Concern has established a team in Pembury whose aim is to visit elderly residents in their homes to discuss problems. Any lonely elderly person in the village who would like to have a call from the visiting group should get in touch with Mrs. Kathleen Meade, the Age Concern organiser in Tunbridge Wells. Mrs. Meade's office is at the Garden Hall Club in Wood Street, Tunbridge Wells, telephone Tunbridge Wells 22591.

Age Concern is also setting up an advice centre for the elderly every Monday from 2 p.m. to 3.30 p.m. at Camden Court, to deal with any problems affecting older people.

It has also established two other services in Pembury. They are a toenail cutting service at home at a cost of 50p and a full chiropody clinic at Camden Court on the third Thursday of every month. This will be held from 1.30 p.m. to 4.30 p.m. and the charge will be £2.50. Transport to the clinic cannot be arranged. Anyone anxious to avail themselves of either of these services should contact Mrs. Meade at the address given above.

IN BRIEF

From time to time the Parish Council is approached by angry residents complaining about neighbours' bonfires and asking for something to be done to stop a nuisance. The answer is that neither Tunbridge Wells Borough Council nor the Parish Council has bye-laws covering bonfires. If you feel aggrieved about a neighbour's bonfire the first step to take is to have a quiet word with him.

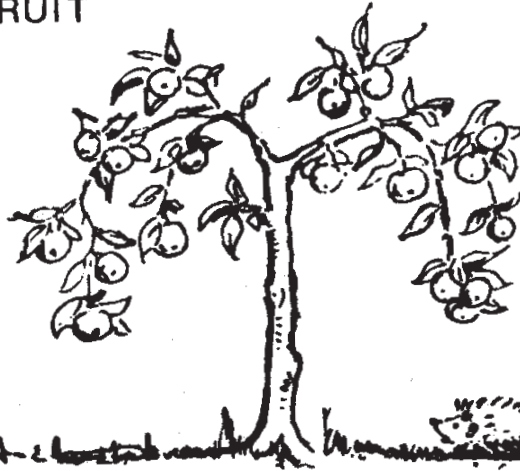
